Colds, Influenza, Stomach Bugs and Strep Throat

As with almost every winter, we've entered the season called: Every bug is out to get you! Not really, though. It just seems like that.

Take everyday preventive actions.

Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it. If you or someone in your family is vomiting or has diarrhea, be sure to disinfect surfaces in the bathroom you or they touched. Wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer. If you are sick with flu-like illness, CDC recommends that you stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone except to get medical care or for other necessities. (Your fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine. Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.

How can hand washing help my family and me?

Poor hygiene, usually unwashed or poorly washed hands on the part of a food handler, often causes food-borne illness outbreaks. Many diarrhea and vomiting illnesses (salmonella, hepatitis A, norovirus) can be passed from person to person. This occurs when someone doesn't wash their hands after using the restroom and then handles food, shakes hands, or touches door knobs. The organism gets into the other person's mouth when touching or eating, and he or she gets sick. Norovirus is often the cause of outbreaks of vomiting and diarrhea on cruise ships!

When should I wash my hands?

- · After using the restroom
- · After handling uncooked meat
- · After changing a diaper
- After taking out the trash

Before eating or handling food

- After handling money
- · After playing with a pet, especially reptiles, iguanas, turtles, and snakes

How do I properly wash my hands?

- · Use warm running water
- · Lather hands with soap any kind will do
- · Rub hands together while you sing the ABCs twice
- · Wash the back of the hands, between the fingers, and under the fingernails
- · Rinse with warm water and pat hands dry
- · Turn off the water using a paper towel or your elbow/wrist

Hand washing is the single most important way of preventing the spread of infections, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Hand washing is the best "low tech" preventer of illnesses. Studies have shown that frequent hand washing actually lowers the rate of absenteeism. We have students wash their hands thoroughly and often. Please encourage this behavior at home.

Flu viruses and Strep throat spread mainly from person to person through coughing or sneezing. Sometimes people may become infected by touching something with the germs on it and then touching their mouth or nose.

It is a school rule that your child should be fever free (below 100 F), without fever reducing medicine, or have not vomited or had diarrhea for at least 24 hours before returning to school. It is important for them to completely recover from their illness so they do not have a relapse as well as to protect the other students from becoming ill.

Below is some information from the CDC (Communicable Disease Center), regarding things to keep in mind for school-age children:

- Encourage children to cover coughs and sneezes, wash hands frequently, and keep hands away from eyes, nose and mouth.
- If a child cannot control his or her cough at home, it won't be any better at school.
- A sick child is advised to stay at home during the first days of illness when symptoms are most severe and the infection is most contagious. Encourage parents of sick children to keep the children away from child care settings until without fever for 24 hours, to prevent spreading illness to others. Unfortunately, children often can spread germs before they actually show symptoms like fever or sore throat.

HEAD LICE INFO

What are Head Lice:

Head lice are tiny insects that feed solely on the blood of people, and are most common on children of early elementary school age. Head lice grasp the head hair with their claws and insert their tiny mouthparts into the skin for just a minute or so to drink a tiny droplet of blood.

- Lice do not hop, jump or fly; Transmission occurs from prolonged direct head to head contact
- Lice cannot burrow into the skin and do not play a role in transmitting any disease-causing organisms.
- Head lice are rarely anything more than a nuisance.
- These insect pests are most commonly shared by direct head-to-head contact.
- Activities such as hugging, play wrestling, and sharing a bed all offer opportunities for lice to spread between friends and family members.
- Lice lay and attach their eggs to hair close to the scalp. They cannot survive more than 1 day without a blood source.

How to manage and prevent head lice at school:

- Head lice infest people, not school buildings or buses.
- A louse that falls from the hair will very likely die within hours, and almost certainly die by the next day. Thus, applying insecticides in the school or bus to control or prevent head lice is unnecessary and wasteful. It may also be prohibited by law.
- If a child is suspected of having lice, he or she should be examined by a medical professional (such as a school nurse), not by a teacher, secretary, or parent volunteer. If a school nurse is present, he or she should make an assessment and **return the child to the classroom per the recommendations of American Academy of Pediatrics and CDC.**
- Head lice may be an annoyance, but they are neither a serious medical problem nor a public health issue reported by the American Academy of Pediatrics and CDC.
- The school's efforts regarding lice should be limited to educating students, parents, and school personnel with up-to-date information.
- The Academy of Pediatrics and the CDC advocate whole classroom screenings, or school-wide screenings, and exclusion for nits or live lice Should Be Discontinued.
- Unjustified actions include screening children for lice or nits, treating children at school, treating the school building, and excluding from school children who are infested or presumably infested.
- Academy of Pediatrics, CDC and National School Nurse Association supports schools should not exclude students for active infestation or when nits remain after appropriate lice treatment.

How to manage nits:

- Lice eggs seem to cause more panic among parents and school staff than does nearly any other problem associated with head lice. Dead eggs and the remnants of hatched eggs remain firmly glued onto the hair for weeks, months, or even years.
- If nits are discovered, look for a live (crawling) louse. If none is found, then the logical conclusion is that the child is likely no longer infested.
- Check again occasionally, but do not treat unless a live louse is found. The vast majority of objects presumed to be nits are simply bits of debris. But because bits of debris are frequently misidentified as lice eggs, many children are misdiagnosed, sent home, and treated unnecessarily.
- Requirements imposed by schools to send children home if they have head lice or nits (often called "nolice" or "no-nits" policies) are without any proven merit, and may result in litigation. Advocates for "no-nits" and similar policies say these efforts reduce the number of infested children and the risk of "catching" lice at school, but there is a lack of evidence supporting their claims.

What parents can do to eliminate and prevent head lice:

- Before considering any kind of treatment, find a live (crawling) insect and make sure it is a louse. If lice are found on one family member, then all other children and adults in the home should be checked as well.
- If the hair is fairly fine and not tangled, then a lice or nit comb can be useful in detecting and removing these insects and their eggs. Some, but not all, infestations can be eliminated by this method.
- Both the American Academy of Pediatrics and the CDC recommend treatment should only be initiated when at least one live louse has been identified.
- If combing is difficult, impractical, or has been unsuccessful, then pediculicides can prove valuable. Pediculicides are special insecticide products registered by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to treat lice. Most over-the-counter (OTC) pediculicides contain pyrethrins (extracts of chrysanthemum flowers) or their synthetic equivalent. Used as directed on the package, these products can be effective at killing lice. A repeat treatment, about 10 days after the first, is often needed.
- Some lice, however, are resistant to OTC products. If live lice are seen the day after the second treatment, parents should call a pediatrician to discuss other kinds of pediculicides, available only by prescription. When used according to their directions, pediculicides offer very little risk to children or adults.
- The main risks from pediculicides (and from virtually any medicine) come from gross overuse of the product, so read the labels carefully and follow the directions. If in doubt, ask your doctor or pharmacist. Avoid treatments that are not FDA-registered pediculicides.
- The American Academy of Pediatrics encourages caregivers to check your child's head for lice regularly.
- The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends the major focus of controlling the spread is to reduce the number of lice on an individual's head and to lessen the risks of head to head contact.
- Fortunately, most children, regardless of the size of their circle of friends and family, will never encounter a head louse. On the rare occasion that a child does acquire head lice, the CDC reports "The burden of unnecessary absenteeism to students, families, and communities far outweigh the risks associated with head lice."

Juniors Research Post-Secondary Plans

During the month of February juniors are encouraged to discuss and research post-secondary options with their parents. Parents are asked to help students narrow the post-secondary selection to three schools by August of 2024. Please note the following suggestions to help with the post secondary search.

- 1. Take a career interest inventory on-line.
- 2. Research post-secondary schools on-line for chosen career fields.
- 3. Arrange post-secondary visits with schools of interest.
- 4. Compile a list of local scholarships & collect applications to review scholarship criteria.
- 5. Meet with college representatives in February, March, & April as they visit Mercer County High School.

2024 Graduates Post-Secondary Up-date

- 1. Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid at www.fafsa.gov as soon as possible.
- 2. Seniors should collect scholarship recommendations from teachers and community members by the second week in February.
- Since housing will be limited at most colleges, seniors should notify colleges early in February and state their plans. Students should then make a housing deposit in about four to six weeks.
- 4. Seniors planning to enter the workforce immediately after high school should be completing job applications.
- 5. Most colleges will allow seniors to take the ACT/SAT on campus, with the understanding that the ACT/SAT scores are only valid at that school. Seniors may take advantage of this opportunity to raise ACT/SAT scores so they are eligible for scholarships at that college.
- 6. Seniors are encouraged to stop by the counselor's office for help in developing a post-secondary plan for next fall.
- 7. Parents are encouraged to call the counselor's office if they have any questions concerning their students post-secondary plans. (Phone: 582-2223 Ext 1)






